To extend opportunities for leadership, we have provided more opportunities for pupils to demonstrate being 'responsibility-led'. Even if a pupil decides to relinquish their role, they are taught how to resign.



In literacy, we enjoyed the thought-provoking novel 'The Faraway Truth'. This acted as our writing stimulus and proved a route into discussions about race, social justice and the justice system.

We also enjoyed the critically acclaimed novel 'Holes' in our reading lessons as we looked heavily at plot devices and unpicked the mystery as we read. Elsewhere, we enjoyed making circuits in our science topic and used this knowledge to make an electronic game in D.T whilst we also embarked on making a three-course meal in our food technology unit.

Also, our study of Crime & Punishment in history lead to a workshop where pupils took the role of forensic scientists in a mock crime scene after they had previously learned about the different crimes committed and punishments provided throughout the ages.

KS2

Year 4 - Throughout Autumn 2, Year 4 participated in exciting new opportunities including the Social Enterprise programme where-by pupils took part in a 'Dragons – Den' venture and were given the task to design a new idea that could help improve the environment that we live in. It was a great success with all children.

In science, Year 4 were investigating the properties of materials that conduct electricity and given the chance to create their own complete circuit using bulbs, wires and batteries. The children could identify how this was working and what would happen if the circuit was incomplete. Additionally, during literacy, Year 4 were reading the story of 'Bill's New Frock' which had messages of stereotypes of which the children could relay back to their learning within PSHE. During this topic, in-depth and professional discussions took place from all classes and greater learning around what a playscript entails.

On top of this, Year 4 attended a viewing of 'Wicked' the musical in London's West End, which provided them with a scope into how a play is put together and the language that is used. It has been a successful term for Year 4 and we look forward to all that Spring has to offer. Well done to each and everyone of you.

Year 3 - During the second half of the Autumn term, the Year 3 students continued to develop their addition and subtraction skills using the column method and exchanging of place values.

In science, we began our unit on rocks and started to compare and contrast the different types and properties of rocks, as well as learn how rocks are created, formed and eroded over time. In RE, we learned about how light is important in different religions, exploring how it is used by people. In PSHE, we learned about how to keep ourselves healthy and our personal wellbeing, using strategies to help us solve problems and looking at the foods that we eat. In history, we continued to explore how the Romans affected life in Britain. Finally, In literacy, we learned about Rosa Parks and we wrote biographies about her life, her experiences and her legacy.

KS1

Year 2 - Last term, the pupils really enjoyed reading The Ugly Five text by Julia Donaldson. We looked at the animals' habitats and the key features of their appearance. The story explores the concept of difference and how we should be accepting of others. Many animals were teased by characters in the story for being 'ugly' so we explored different emotions through the use of drama. We spoke about the importance of treating others how we wish to be treated; and how beauty comes in different forms.

In geography, we concluded our London unit with children drawing their own maps of the city. These were fantastic and have demonstrated the rich knowledge they have gained throughout the unit.

Science has been a highlight for many children, learning about different materials. They have looked at the properties in order to identify suitable materials for different objects. By conducting explorations to test the strength of different materials, they were able to design their own dungarees that had to be durable and flexible for a toddler.

We are extremely excited for this term where the children will be learning about sea creatures; plants; and even The Plague! We look forward to your continued support.

Year 1 - Last term was a wonderful term in Year 1! We enjoyed creating moving picture books, writing a retell of the Three Billy Goats Gruff, visiting Dagenham Parish Church and our favourite part had to be our visit to the Ragged School museum.

In history, children compared school life in Victorian times to our present day school life. They had the chance to dress in Victorian clothes and experience life in Miss Perkin's strict' Victorian classroom.

Children continued to learn new sounds in phonics lessons and a child from each class won a book from the vending machine because they had read three times or more! There will be a new winner next time so keep reading and getting those planners signed!

We ended the term with a fabulous performance of 'Jingle Bells' in our Christmas concert and enjoyed our winter festival, especially the hot chocolate and marshmallows!

Reception - The Reception classes had fantastic time together! We went through a term filled with celebrations, joy, and happiness!

The pupils enjoyed celebrating Bonfire Night, making variety of fireworks collages, and learning about the different noises fireworks can make. We managed to see pictures and videos from all around England and how people celebrate this historical event.

School Uniform

School Catering

Primary school children in state-funded schools in London will get free school meals for the 2023-24 school year. The Mayor of London is providing this funding as an emergency cost of living support measure. **This has now been extended to the 2024-25 school year.**

Children who are entitled to free school meals because of family circumstances bring an additional £1,320 into the school budget. Therefore, if your child is entitled to FSM you still need to apply and register your entitlement, otherwise the school will not receive this additional funding.
