Updates from classes -

Year 6 – This term, Year 6 has shown remarkable dedication and hard work as they focused on revising for their SATS exams. Last week, they completed their tests, and we are confident that their diligent preparation will be reflected in excellent results, which will be announced in July.

In addition to their academic efforts, the students had the opportunity to participate in the interactive Streets Ahead workshop. This engaging session taught them important lessons about road safety, ensuring they are well-equipped to stay safe on the streets. We are incredibly proud of their achievements and enthusiasm both in and out of the classroom. Well done, Year 6!

Year 5 – This half term, we explored the fascinating world of space, studying how different planets interact with each other. Our exploration included examining the phases of the moon and employing various scientific methods to evaluate theories such as the Heliocentric and Geocentric models. As we move into the final half-term, we will shift our focus to biology, exploring topics related to health and safety.

In our design and technology lessons, we engaged in an exciting project to create stuffed toys. We followed the Design, Make, and Evaluate model, which allowed students to experience the full design process. Though threading a needle was initially challenging, with the invaluable guidance from Ms. Echim and Ms. Rashid, we quickly mastered the skill. We cut our own fabric, added various appliqués, and employed the blanket stitch to complete the project. The results were extremely satisfying, and you can expect to see these wonderful creations coming home in the next few days!

Year 4 – We have been working exuberantly hard on their timetables practice in preparation for their MTC after the half term. We have seen excellent progress being made through consistent fluency practice in lessons and the use of TTRS. Additionally, in both literacy and history, Year 4 have been learning about the importance of the Windrush generation and why this was a significant time in British History. Through reading the novel 'The Windrush Child', pupils have been given an insight into what life was like for people leaving their homes and to start a new life in Britain.

In science we studied the digestive system and the vital organs that formulate this process. They have been investigating on how food is digested and the importance of healthy living. Similarly, in geography, children have been learning about the water cycle and how all life depends upon the use water. Through a variety of investigations, pupils have been able to learn the movement of water which is vital to correlating this to understanding its importance.

A small group of Year 4 children represented Beam County at the Barking and Dagenham Dragons' Den showcasing the water irrigation system that all of the year group had created and designed. We may not have been chosen as the overall winners but through the determination, dedication and persistency, we triumphed by establishing a well thought through presentation that showed professionalism which echoes around our school.

Updates from class-

Year 3 — This term, Year 3 has been busy manifesting their culinary knowledge and skills in design and technology. Our topic has been based around seasonal foods grown in the UK and a little insight into the importation of foods from other parts of the world. We have reviewed preparations skills and applied these to designing and making our own tarts using seasonal ingredients. In history, we have continued our journey from the Stone Age and Bronze Age, through the Iron Age and onto our new topic of Ancient Egypt. The pupils have thoroughly enjoyed the introduction to learning about a new civilization and have begun to make connections to their research assignment.

In science, the children have been expanding their knowledge and understanding of the different parts of a plant and the functions of the leaves, the stem, the roots and how they are all interconnected as a system. In addition, we have been observing how physical changes, such as missing leaves, can affect the growth over time. For RE, we have been looking at symbolism and artefacts found within Islam and Christianity, and discussing how and why they are important to members of each faith, as well as the story of Noah's Ark.

For computing, we have completed our programming and coding unit using the Scratch software to create small loops and animations of characters and dialogue to help tell a story. Recently, we have moved on to a new unit about data handling and have begun to make connections to the real world. In PE, the children have been continuing to develop their swimming skills and racket skills in tennis such as forward and backhand swings.

Year 2 — Picture this, during our summer half-term, the art of the matter has been a self portrait, layering different coloured paper and card to build up a facial image. Miss Yousef in year 3 provided the children in year 2 with a deepened insight into particular religious festivals that are practised and celebrated i.e., Ramadan e.g., Eid-UI Fitr. The children celebrated at the end with a meal. We compared the similarities and differences of this festival with another i.e., Christian e.g., Lent

In geography children used their smart, technologically advanced thoughts into what makes an appealing settlement to live in i.e., village, town or city e.g., solar lighting; water/heat pumps from different climatic conditions. History went up in flames. Our Great Fire of London simulation heated up in the eco area, carefully and safely, watching how the fire spread so quickly in our controlled metal cage.

During literacy we have been making and cooking up a treat with Marcuccilli's Marvellous Medicine. A magic potion to change your child or Grandma. Don't do this at home parents!

Year 1 – This half-term has been filled with lots of fun and engaging learning in Year 1. The children have had many hands-on experiences in science, geography and computing where they have been on insect and flower hunts around the school, been on local walks to take traffic surveys and learned to represent data in different ways.

In literacy, the children have loved learning facts about endangered animals through the text Dear Greenpeace and explored halves and quarters of shapes in maths. History has also offered enriching experiences learning about the seaside in the Victorian era.

Updates from class-

Reception – Our clever Reception pupils had an amazing term filled with fun learning and activities! We dived into the world of traditional tales and read together stories such as 'The Three Little Pigs', 'Jack and the Beanstalk' and 'The Gingerbread Man'.

The children have learned to talk about events and principal characters in stories and suggest how the story might end. They managed to express their creativity creating their own characters and writing their own imaginative stories.

The children are now confident to recognise tricky words on sight and write them in their literacy work. They are more than experts to write a short character description and to write about a key event from traditional tales.

Our outstanding mathematicians have been amazing at demonstrating their knowledge in subitising numbers to 10, knowing the doubles to 10, sharing into equal groups, knowing odd and even numbers and using number facts for addition and subtraction.

One of the best parts of this term was learning about the lifecycle of different living things including chicks, caterpillars and beans. How to plant and look after beans. About the seasons and the changing of the year from spring to summer.

Nursery – This half term in Nursery we have been learning about lifecycles. We started the term with the arrival of 8 fertile chicken eggs that were close to hatching. The children were fascinated when the eggs started to crack and they were able to watch the chicks make their way out into this world! They have also planted beans which are growing well and we are currently caring for some caterpillars that are starting to get very big and will start to spin their cocoons soon. The children have really enjoyed observing these natural processes and it has been wonderful to hear the conversations they have with each other about what they can see happening.

In maths we have been learning to say if there are more or fewer objects, naming 2D and 3D shapes and recognising their properties. The children enjoyed building with 3D objects and drawing pictures with 2D shapes. They are now recognising when they see these shapes in their environment.

They have also practiced rolling spherical shapes with different materials and then used paper clay to make a caterpillar.

The children have learnt to retell the stories 'The Very Hungry Caterpillar' and 'Jasper's Beanstalk' and are starting to become confident speakers and performers.

They have also been working very hard on writing their names and some of them are becoming confident writers already!



School Catering

Primary school children in state-funded schools in London will get free school meals for the 2023-24 school year. The Mayor of London is providing this funding as an emergency cost of living support measure. **This has now been extended to the 2024-25 school year.**

Children who are entitled to free school meals because of family circumstances bring an additional £1,320 into the school budget. Therefore, if your child is entitled to FSM you still need to apply and register your entitlement, otherwise the school will not receive this additional funding.
